



A. Bryce Hoflund, Assistant Professor, School of Public Administration, University of Nebraska at Omaha – Ms. Hoflund most recently served as a Project Associate at VTIPG and currently is completing her Ph.D. in Public Administration and Public Policy at the Virginia Tech Center for Public Administration and Policy (CPAP). Her dissertation entitled, *Conducting a Dissonant Symphony: A Case Study of Network Entrepreneurship in the National Quality Forum*, explores the leadership tasks associated with creating a network organization to address quality issues in health care. Starting in January 2009, she will be an Assistant Professor in UNO's School of Public Administration. Ms. Hoflund has extensive research, work, and teaching experience in the public and nonprofit sectors. While at VTIPG, Ms. Hoflund worked on agency personnel management, and human welfare service research and technical assistance projects. She served as project manager for a personnel compensation study VTIPG conducted for the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles. She has worked for the Nature Conservancy, the Carnegie Commission on Science, Technology, and Government, Senator Robert Dole, and Senator Connie Mack. Ms. Hoflund recently published an article in *Regulation & Governance* that explores some of the virtues and shortcomings of applying a democratic experimentalist approach to health care regulation. She has taught graduate and undergraduate classes at Virginia Tech and Elon University related to the research, organization, and administration of public and nonprofit organizations, including Regulatory Policy and Global Business Regulation, Policy Analysis and Program Evaluation, Public and Nonprofit Financial Management, Leadership in Public and Nonprofit Organizations, and Introduction to Public Administration. She received an MPA from Florida State University and a B.A. in Political Science with a minor in Public Administration from American University. Ms. Hoflund's research interests include regulation, organizational networks, leadership, and health care policy.
